Rev. Ivy Thomas: December Message

How do you wait? Are you patient and calm, allowing time to pass peacefully? Are you an anxious wait-er, worrying about the what ifs, and the how comes? Perhaps you're an impatient wait-er, pacing the floor, checking your watch and tapping your toe, finding it hard to believe that time could possibly pass so slowly.

Advent is a time of waiting. It lasts a mere four weeks (at most) and leads us into the celebration of the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day. In any typical year, the world would have us shopping for gifts, decorating our homes, and baking in preparation for the days ahead when family will gather to celebrate Love. Of course, there are also, usually, the preparations for Christmas concerts, school recitals and breakfast and photos with Santa.

Indeed, any "normal" Advent season flies by in what seems like the blink of an eye and before we know it, it's Christmas, New Year's Eve and the beginning of the slow climb out of winter darkness into the light of spring.

But this is no "normal" Advent season. This year, waiting will take on a whole new look. Any shopping to be done will mostly be done online. There will be little need to bake or prepare the house for visitors, as everyone cocoons in their own small, family bubble. Concerts and other seasonal celebrations have been cancelled in an effort to prevent the spread of Covid and nobody wants to get close enough to the Jolly Fellow to sit on his knee for a picture!!

So how will you wait, this year? What new tradition might you engage, to bring light and hope into the darkness of these winter days? How will you shift your engagement with others so that connections are made, and love is shared, if only at a distance?

It will be important, this year, more than others, to take the time to consider how you will engage this waiting time. With so many extra minutes on our hands, it seems like a perfect time to begin (or expand upon) a practice of prayerful listening. When we stop, listen in the silence, and relax into the moment, we just might hear God 's voice, offering us words unexpected, wisdom unsolicited, and comfort longed for.

As we wait, in our own unique way, for the coming of the Christ child, may we know that, despite how it may seem, we do not wait alone. God's love is always with us, Christ's light is always shining, and Spirit's voice is always at the ready, to lead us out of darkness, into new life.

May this Advent (and Christmas) season, bring its own unique gifts to each of us, as we learn new ways of waiting and celebrating the birth of the Word Made Flesh among us.

Winter Book Study Thursday Mornings 10:30am to 11:30am, Starting Jan. 14th 2021

This winter we will look at what decolonization means for us as people of faith. We will consider the history of Indigenous - settler relations through focusing on our own stories in this ongoing relationship. We will use as our guide *Unsettling Spirit: A Journey into Decolonization*, by settler educator and activist Denise Nadeau. This seven week book study will involve discussion of the book and sharing our own stories, as well as a brief introduction to some of the teachings of the *Syilx/Okanagan peoples in whose territory we live*.

Denise Nadeau (MDIV, DMin) is a writer, educator and activist of mixed European heritage from Quebec, now residing in Lkwungen territory on Vancouver Island. She is a trained somatic educator and is an Affiliate Assistant Professor in the Department of Religions and Cultures at Concordia University in Montreal where she taught Indigenous Traditions, Women and Colonialism for several years.

Unsettling Spirit: A Journey into Decolonization
By Denise M. Nadeau / Foreword by Deanna Reder

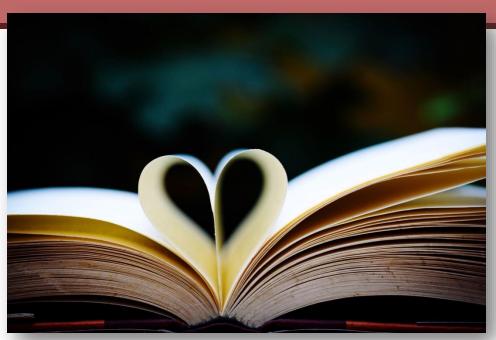
What does it mean to be a white settler on land taken from peoples who have lived there since time immemorial? In the context of reconciliation and Indigenous resurgence, *Unsettling Spirit* provides a personal perspective on decolonization, informed by Indigenous traditions and lifeways, and the need to examine one's complicity with colonial structures.

The author shares stories form her early and brief experience of "Native mission" in the late 1980s and early 1990s in northern Canada and Chiapas, Mexico, and the gradual recognition that she had internalized colonialist concepts of the "good Christian" and the Great White Helper. She goes back to look at her family's history in Quebec and uncovers the responsibilities that come with facing this history.

Incorporating insights from Indigenous ethical and legal frameworks, *Unsettling Spirit* offers an accessible reflection on possibilities for settler decolonization

A foreword by Cree-Métis author Deanna Reder places the work in a broader context of Indigenous scholarship. The cover image is by Mi'gmaq beader Bernadine Martin

Outreach Committee Report

Hello St. Paul's,

Your Outreach Committee met recently to disburse 2020 Outreach funds to some of the many worthwhile programs in our community that are helping those in need. On your behalf, we will contribute to the following:

- 1. As in prior years, we will provide 40 \$25 Independent Grocers gift cards as Christmas presents for the residents at Willowbridge.
- 2. In a normal year, the Outreach Willowbridge Team provides a meal six times a year for the residents. This year, with COVD lockdown, Canadian Mental Health started providing the residents with one meal per day. In March, St. Paul's contributed \$200 towards the cost of the meals. These daily meals have been discontinued. Willowbridge is now providing a meal inhouse each weekend. They are also planning a Christmas meal on December 18th. St. Paul's will contribute an additional \$500 towards the ongoing cost of the meals.
- 3. Canadian Mental Health: Kelowna administers a Graduated Rent Supplement program that is part of the Journey Home Society's initiative to end homelessness. We will contribute \$1,000 to this vitally important program. Our 2020 potluck money was to go towards this program.
- 4. Childhood Connections Okanagan Family and Childhood Care Society, Nourish Families Initiative, is putting together Christmas hampers for a special Christmas dinner for their clients who do not have access to other programs. We will contribute \$1,500 towards filling these hampers with Christmas goodies.

Thank you St. Paul's. Without your offerings the Outreach Committee could not assist worthwhile community programs.

If we were meeting in person we would be having a separate Christmas Offering. If you would like to make a specific Christmas Offering to any these causes, you can send your donation to St. Paul's with the money specified for Outreach, in General or to a specific purpose. These are only a small number of worthy causes such as Salvation Army, Food Bank, etc. that are worthy of our help.

When people buy a local restaurant meal online from Nourish Families, the restaurant makes an extra meal for one of their clients. Currently there are 20 families receiving meals, with 10 families on the waiting list.

The children of eligible families must be under the age of 12. When a family receives a meal they also receive a play component to enhance the therapy the child is receiving.

We asked the ladies if there was any way that St. Paul's could assist their program. Here are some possible ways:

We can now confirm that we have funds for a proper ready-made Christmas dinner for ALL of our families (almost 60 families!) thanks to Minister Ivy Thomas and Linda Hutchinson from St. Paul's Church for raising \$1,500 to cover the cost of Christmas dinner!

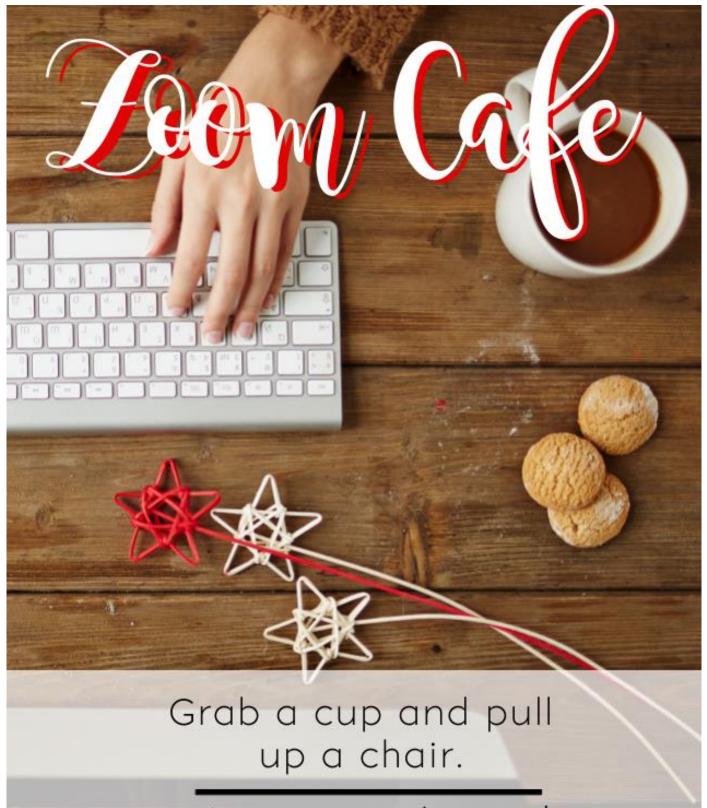
